The true story of Saint Valentine is shrouded in historical ambiguity, as there were multiple individuals named Valentine who were martyred during the early Christian era. Due to the lack of detailed records, it is challenging to separate fact from legend. However, here is a general overview of the historical context surrounding Saint Valentine:

Valentine, derived from the Latin name Valentinus, was a relatively common name in ancient Rome. It is believed that at least two Christian martyrs named Valentine existed, both of whom

were associated with acts of compassion and love.

One account suggests that Valentine was a priest living in Rome in the 3rd century AD. During this time, Emperor Claudius II issued a decree banning young men from marrying, as he believed that single men made better soldiers. Valentine, however, continued to perform Christian weddings in secret. When his actions were discovered, he was arrested and imprisoned.

While in prison, Valentine is said to have performed miracles and healed the daughter of his jailer. Before his execution, tradition holds that he wrote a farewell letter to the girl, signing it "From your Valentine," thus popularizing the phrase.

Another account suggests that Valentine was a bishop in Terni, Italy. Like the previously mentioned Valentine, he was known for his piety and acts of kindness. He, too, was persecuted for his Christian faith and executed during the reign of Emperor Aurelian.

The commemoration of Valentine's Day on February 14th may have originated from the 5th-century efforts of Pope Gelasius I, who sought to replace the pagan festival of Lupercalia, a fertility celebration, with a Christian feast day honoring Saint Valentine.

It is important to note that much of what is known about Saint Valentine is based on legends and traditions that developed over the centuries. The lack of historical documentation makes it challenging to ascertain the precise details of his life and martyrdom.

Regardless of the uncertainties surrounding Saint Valentine, he has become a symbol of love, compassion, and devotion. His association with romantic love has made him an enduring figure connected to the celebration of Valentine's Day in popular culture and traditions worldwide.



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Tonto Basin Community Meeting Minutes January 2, 2024

Supervisor Humphrey opened the meeting with the Pledge of Allegiance. He then covered his recent activities which included attending the Payson Tea Party Christmas Dinner, holding a Gisela Community Meeting, holding a Roosevelt Community Meeting, and appearing on KQSS radio at 5:30 PM on Monday the 11th of December. He will be the guest speaker at the Globe Rotary luncheon tomorrow, will hold a Roosevelt Community Meeting on the 8th and will be on KQSS on the 8th at 5:30 PM.

Walnut Springs Blvd, Walnut Canyon Culvert Replacement Project

The Board of Supervisors approved the request to advertise invitation for bids for the Walnut Springs Blvd, Walnut Canyon Culvert Replacement Project. The project is in Punkin Center along Walnut Springs Blvd at Walnut Canyon south of Four Peaks Road.

We will be removing the existing five 36-inch culverts and constructing a new two (2) barrel 10'x6' concrete box culvert. This will include grading, paving, riprap,

Short Term Rental **Ordinance**

The recent Short Term Rental Ordinance the

BOS approved regarding VRBO's and Airbnb's. This ordinance will allow Gila County to permit, regulate and enforce vacation rental and shortterm rental uses in the unincorporated areas of Gila County. The purpose of this Ordinance is to protect the public health, safety, and welfare of the public and of owners and users of vacation rental and short-term rental properties in the unincorporated area of Gila County. The adoption of this Ordinance is to comply with Arizona Revised Statutes § 11-269.17.

EAC/Gila Pueblo Law Enforcement Training Academy

The EAC/Gila Pueblo Law Enforcement Training Academy. In May of 2023, the Board of Supervisors approved an economic development grant in the amount of \$10,000 to The Globe/Miami Gun Club, Inc. to fund the improvements to the gun range required by Arizona

Police Officers Standards and Training (AZPOST) to establish the EAC/Gila Pueblo Law Enforcement Training Academy. That economic development grant was funded through Supervisor Humphrey's (District 2) constituent funds.

In November of 2023, Lee Kinnard, EAC/Gila Pueblo Campus Law **Enforcement Training Academy** Coordinator reached out and explained some miscommunication had occurred regarding the amount of funding needed for The Globe/ Miami Gun Club, Inc. Supervisor Humphrey and Chief Walters then agreed to split the remaining \$7,324 needed to fully pay for the work required at the firearms range by providing an additional \$3,662 each.

The college has not held a training academy since 1997 (25 years). The college and the local law enforcement community believe that this academy will be tremendously helpful in training and retaining the much-needed police officers and deputies for our local communities.

December community questions

Supervisor Humphrey let residents know that county staff is always available and willing to assist in any situation and will research and provide answers to any questions the residents have. He stated that the residents may not always like the answers, but that staff will always assist in finding the answer. Supervisor Humphrey said that although 3 residents had requested a meeting prior to Christmas, with the holidays it wasn't possible to assemble staff and set up a meeting before our January 2nd community meeting. Supervisor Humphrey said that the questions Mr. Randall submitted at our December meeting have all been answered. He told residents that if they had specific questions that we couldn't answer at

our meeting to please write them down and we would get the answer for them.



Community Questions by Residents

1. QUESTION: A resident asked if the County had a Dark Sky ordinance. She stated that her friend has neighbors that have bright lights on at their home 24/7.

ANSWER: Randy responded that we do have a Dark Sky ordinance. It states that any light you have on should be shielded and the light should not leave your property. He said that a shielding rule of thumb is if you can see the light bulb, it is not shielded properly. Randy asked the resident to provide the address of the person so that staff could observe and make sure the ordinance was being followed. A resident commented that the ordinance sounds excessive.

2. QUESTION: A resident then asked if community members would be able to have a community walk across the bridge prior to it being opened.

ANSWER: Tom Goodman responded that the bridge will be open to traffic by mid-May and that the

will be open to traffic by mid-May and that the county will have a ribbon cutting for the bridge that will include the community in June 2024. Tom then let residents know that A-Cross will be permanently closed next week. A resident asked who made the decision to close A-Cross. Tom stated that the decision was made by US Fish and Wildlife, Tonto National Forest Service and Gila County. The resident then stated that they live in North Bay Estates and that the closing of A-Cross will block their exit in the event of a fire. Supervisor Humphrey then asked the resident to write down their concerns and that he would get in touch with Jeremy Plain and discuss them.

A different resident then tried to explain that A-Cross is in the lake area and when the lake rises, A-Cross is under water. Tom let folks know that 4 of the concrete decks on the bridge were poured today. Tom said that the bridge is 1996' long and 503 cubic feet of concrete was poured today.

A resident asked if there was going to be electricity on the bridge. Tom responded that there would be no electricity and that the bridge would have raised reflectors. A resident asked what flood level the bridge has been designed for. Tom stated that the

bridge is engineered for a 500-year flood event.



Tonto Basin Fire Department Information

Chief Stoltenberg of the Tonto Basin Fire Department shared that the Department was able to adopt 3 families for the Christmas season with help from the community. He said that the Department had

received a grant from the 100 Club that allowed them to purchase 2 AED's and that the Department also received a \$5,000 grant from APS which will pay for the Departments pancake breakfast and school outreach. The Department is also under contract with APS to put solar arrays over the outdoor parking. The generated power will be returned to the grid and the shade provided by the panels will help with cooling costs in the department.

A resident let the chief know that the property bordering the department was in escrow and that now would be a good time to request an easement. The chief also said the Department received their rating and is rated 66Y which means insurance rates for fire insurance will not go up for the residents.



Roosevelt Cottages RV Park

A resident asked what the project by the IGA is. Randy said it is The Roosevelt Cottages RV Park. He said there will be 135 spaces and the pads should be poured in the next few months. The resident asked where the RV park would be getting their water. Randy said that they drilled a well and would also be utilizing the water company. Chief Stoltenberg interjected that his department is in negotiations with the RV park to have a fire pump and additional standpipes installed.

Gila County Library

Elaine Vortuba, Gila County Librarian came forward and let residents know that the library is a terrific resource and that available for residents to



utilize. A resident asked why DVD's couldn't be ordered from other county libraries to Tonto Basin. Elaine said that DVD's are the only item that can't be transferred from one library to another as they are small and easily damaged or lost.



Gila County Public Works Rural Addressing

Homero Vela, Gila County Public Works Director took the floor and explained the process for obtaining an address on vacant land. He presented a handout detailing the process and let residents know if they would like

more information to contact Tom Homan in Rural Addressing. Homero then said that 2024 would be a great year in Public Works. There are currently over \$50 million dollars in projects within Gila County. They are funded by both state and federal monies. He said that the Walnut Springs project is being funded by the state and that the bridge is being federally funded.

A resident then asked Supervisor Humphrey if we could invite someone from TDS to the next meeting. A resident stated that she had heard that ATT was going to be putting up a tower in Tonto Basin. She then thanked everyone who participated in the Electric Light Parade and said that there had been 35 entries.

A resident asked if anyone had ever done a study on the aquifer in Tonto Basin. Margret Rambo stated that Greenback Vista had done a study in the 1990's.

A resident asked if we could invite someone to discuss becoming a member of search and rescue.

While these reptiles play crucial roles in their ecosystems, it's important to take precautions to ensure both your safety and their well-being. Here are some tips to help you coexist with desert reptiles responsibly:

Educate Yourself: Familiarize yourself with the types of reptiles that inhabit your area. Research their behaviors, preferred habitats, and typical locations. Common desert reptiles include lizards, rattlesnakes, gopher snakes, and tortoises.

Maintain Distance: When you encounter a desert reptile, give it ample space and avoid approaching or attempting to touch it. Remember, they are wild animals and may perceive human contact as a threat. Admire them from a safe distance and allow them to carry on with their natural activities.

Watch Your Step: Keep a keen eye on your surroundings, especially when hiking or exploring desert regions. Many reptiles, particularly snakes, rely on camouflage for protection, making them difficult to spot. Stick to established trails and avoid tall grass, rocks, and other potential hiding spots where reptiles may be concealed.

Wear Appropriate Footwear: Protect your feet by wearing closed-toe shoes or boots when venturing into desert areas. This footwear provides an extra layer of defense against accidental encounters with reptiles or other hazards.

Secure Trash and Food: Desert reptiles are opportunistic and may be attracted to food scraps or improperly stored trash. Ensure that your food is properly sealed and dispose of waste in designated containers to minimize the risk of attracting



reptiles to your area.

Create a Barrier: If you live in an area where desert reptiles are prevalent, consider creating a barrier around your property to discourage their entry. This can include installing snake-proof fencing or sealing off any gaps or openings that may serve as potential access points.

Be Cautious at Night: Many desert reptiles, such as snakes, may become more active during the cooler evenings of spring. Use caution when moving around at night, and carry a flashlight to illuminate your path and make reptiles more visible.

Teach Children about Reptile Safety: Educate children about the importance of respecting and appreciating desert reptiles from a safe distance. Teach them not to touch or disturb these creatures and to alert an adult if they encounter one.

If you encounter a desert reptile in a residential area or believe there is a potential threat, contact your local animal control or a wildlife management agency for assistance. Remember, respecting the natural habitat and behaviors of desert reptiles is key to coexisting harmoniously with these fascinating creatures during the spring season and beyond.

When is Arizona's 2024 Presidential Preference Election?

Arizona's Presidential Preference Election (PPE) is set for March 19. The eligibility requirements for voting in the PPE are different than for the primary election, which covers all other offices and will be held Aug. 6.

Voters must be registered as either Democrat or Republican to cast a ballot in the PPE. The deadline to register, or change affiliation, and be eligible to vote in the PPE is Feb. 20.

Unlike in the PPE, independents can vote in Arizona's primary without changing their registration status by requesting a ballot for the party of their choice from their county recorder's office.

Voters can check their registration status on the Arizona Secretary of State's Office web portal and update their information, if necessary, at Service
